History of Calcutta SEED-Sowing seeds of education, bearing fruits of development

Founding Vision and Inspiration (1981-1994)

The origins and the inspiration of the Calcutta Society for Encouragement of Education and Development (Calcutta SEED) trace back to the unwavering love, dedication, and self-sacrifice of one pious woman—Agnes Menezes. Agnes, a simple government primary school teacher from a village in Mangalore, was the eldest sister of Fr. Franklin Menezes (the present Secretary of Calcutta SEED) and played a pivotal role in shaping his future. Fr. Franklin, the twelfth and youngest child of his parents who themselves had never received formal schooling, benefited immensely from Agnes' sacrifices. Twenty-five years older to him, Agnes, despite her modest education, made it her mission to ensure her youngest baby brother received the best possible opportunities. She enrolled him at St. Aloysius Boarding School, where Franklin excelled both academically and in extracurricular activities.

After completing his education, Franklin followed his calling to the priesthood, entering the seminary and later being ordained for the Archdiocese of Calcutta. He pursued his philosophical and theological studies at Morning Star College and Jnana Deepa

Vidyapeeth, Pune respectively, before teaching for two years at Morning Star Seminary. In 1981, he left for Rome to further his education, earning a doctorate in Sacred Theology and a Licentiate in Sacred Scripture.

Fr. Franklin's six-year stay in Europe exposed him to the stark contrasts between the economic prosperity of the West and the underdevelopment he had seen in India, a gap he attributed to differences in education, innovation, and diligence. Upon his return to India in 1987, Fr. Franklin was committed to addressing the educational challenges faced by underprivileged children. He shared his concerns with Fr. John Noronha, who was then the Parish Priest of Infant Jesus Church. Behala, and a former Director of Seva Kendra Calcutta. Fr. Noronha proposed the idea of establishing a registered society, emphasizing the importance of involving individuals from diverse professional backgrounds to ensure continuity, sustainability, and accountability.

With his vast experience in social work and expertise in establishing registered societies, Fr. Noronha took on the task of setting up this organization. By 1991, he had gathered a group of like-minded individuals in Calcutta, all dedicated to advancing the cause of education for economically disadvantaged children. This effort led collaborative to the registration of the Calcutta Society for Encouragement of Education and Development (Calcutta SEED) on July 22, 1994, under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act, 1961.



The founding executive committee consisted of key figures committed to addressing the educational and social needs of underprivileged communities:

- Rev. Dr. Franklin Menezes (President)
- Mr. Percy Jones (Vice-President)
- Rev. Fr. John Noronha (Secretary)
- Mrs. Leanette Lewis (Treasurer)
- Dr. Satrujit Dasgupta, Mr. Manabendra Nath Mondal, and Mr. John Fernandes (Members) Under their leadership, Calcutta SEED quickly expanded its efforts beyond Calcutta, extending its reach to tribal and rural communities in Bengal and Assam, setting the foundation for its enduring mission of educational and social empowerment.



At the Annual General Meeting held on October 18, 2001, Bishop Cyprian Monis was elected as the President and Fr. I.P. Sarto as the Secretary and Fr. Franklin Menezes as the Treasurer. During the period 2001 to 2009, a lot of work was done under the dynamic leadership of Fr. I.P. Sarto.

On December 09, 2009, Fr. Gerry Machado was elected as the Secretary of Calcutta SEED.

On September 27, 2014, there was a change of office bearers:

Archbishop Thomas D'Souza (President) Fr. Franklin Menezes (Secretary)

The society was founded with the vision of creating "An educated and developed society built on the values of justice, fellowship and love" and its mission is, "to build a society where peace is rooted in justice, love thrives through freedom, and hope is sustained by faith, creating a foundation for true growth and unity".



Gifts and Contributions (1994-2007)

One of the pivotal moments in the early years of Calcutta SEED was the donation of a piece of land by Ms. Maya Gomes, a pious and devout parishioner of Infant Jesus Church, Behala. At that time, the land had turned into a water body covered with weeds and she feared that her land would be illegally taken over by people with vested interests. Ms. Maya Gomes had initially intended to donate the land for a church; however, the parcel was too small for such a construction. At the suggestion of Fr. John Noronha (who was then the Parish Priest of Infant Jesus Church, Behala), she agreed to gift the land to Calcutta SEED to support its providing mission of education development opportunities for underprivileged children. However, the land, measuring 4 Kathas and 11 chataks, was left undeveloped for several years due to a lack of funds for development.

It was only after Fr. Franklin took a sabbatical and stayed at St. Philip's Church in Pasadena, California, USA, that, with the support and permission of Fr. Joe Moniz, the then parish priest of St. Philip's, he was able to raise the necessary funds to develop the land. This effort, along with the assistance of a few other donors arranged through Fr. John Noronha's

contacts, made it possible to construct a building on the site. Thereafter, under the leadership of Fr. I.P. Sarto, the then Secretary of Calcutta SEED, construction began, and the Human Resource Development Centre at Shakuntala Park was completed in 2007. The same building was later converted to St. Philip's Nursery School on June 16, 2008.

Early Programs and Educational Support (1995-2005)

Calcutta SEED's activities began with a focus on educational assistance. By the mid-1990s, they were sponsoring children's education, providing funds for books, uniforms, school fees, and boarding expenses. Some key accomplishments include:

- 1995-1996: Sponsored 49 children and provided educational assistance to 72 more. Medical assistance was given to one child for an aortic valve operation.
- 1996-1997: Sponsored 44 children and supported 135 children with educational assistance. Additionally, seven children received medical aid.
- 1997-1998: Sponsored 40 children and offered educational assistance to 58 more. Medical help was provided to eight children.

The society also initiated vocational guidance programs, providing career guidance to youth and hosting seminars for parents on value education. In 1998, a vocational guidance cell was established to assist young people in choosing appropriate careers.

Community Development and Tribal Education (1998-2005)

Calcutta SEED's focus expanded to include rural and tribal communities. Notably, between 1998 and 2000, the society adopted the "Skill Targeted Academic Growth" methodology, developed by Fr. Mongal Das, SJ, to educate Santhal tribal children. This method was implemented in 15 centers, reaching more than 1,000 children.

Additional community development programs included:

- 1999-2000: Village surveys were conducted in 11 villages in Burdwan District to assess literacy levels and socio-economic conditions. Calcutta SEED organized motivation sessions for parents, emphasizing the importance of education, particularly for girl children.
- **2000-2001:** Self-help groups (SHGs) were established in 15 villages with 1,500 women, promoting financial independence and self-reliance.
- **2001-2002:** Calcutta SEED helped strengthen traditional village institutions, including tribal heads and panchayats, to manage crises like natural disasters. Additionally, 50 houses were built for victims of the 2001 floods.



Disaster Management and Rehabilitation (2000-2005)

Calcutta SEED played a significant role in disaster relief and rehabilitation during the floods that affected Bengal in 2000 and 2001. The society extended food aid to 10,000 families and provided medical services to flood-affected communities. In addition to emergency assistance, Calcutta SEED built houses for flood victims, constructing over 200 homes by 2005.

St. Philip's School and Expansion (2007-2008)

The Shakuntala Park land, which had been donated by Ms. Maya Gomes, finally came to fruition with the establishment of St. Philip's Nursery School on June 16, 2008. The school started with just two children and grew steadily under the care of Mrs. Manjula Ghosh and her team. By the second year, the number of students had increased to 21, and the school became a hub of activity, offering competitions in recitation, drawing, fancy dress, and singing.

Continued Community Development and Vocational Training (2005-2008)

As Calcutta SEED's programs evolved, the focus remained on community development and vocational training for youth. Some key initiatives included:

- 2004-2005: Twelve SHGs were formed for Santhal women in Burdwan, allowing them to take loans for self-employment ventures. This financial independence enabled them to send their children to English-medium schools.
- 2007-2008: The Human Resource Development Centre at Shakuntala Park became operational, and the Sisters of the 'Handmaids of Mary' arrived to begin educational programs for local children on 4th June 2017 and after a year in 2018 took full charge of the school.

Work in Progress (2009-2024)



Over the years, Calcutta SEED has provided educational support to over 2,000 children, with regular follow-up visits to ensure their progress. More than 100 youth were guided through vocational programs, many of whom went on to pursue technical education and careers in fields like carpentry, electronics, and nursing.


Medical assistance was another critical area of Calcutta SEED's work. Calcutta SEED provided medical support to numerous children for surgeries, treatments, and disaster-related health issues. Health promotion programs were also initiated to combat malnutrition and improve hygiene in rural areas.

As will become evident through the pages that follow, under the able leadership of Archbishop Thomas D'Souza and the dedicated efforts of Fr. Franklin Menezes and other members of the Executive Board, Calcutta SEED has made remarkable strides in various areas concerning education and development. Two Learning Centres for underprivileged children have been established, initiated women's empowerment programs through solar assembling training, tailoring, and computer education, and provided youth with essential computer training. In the field of healthcare, a new homeopathy clinic has been set up, and in labour welfare, initiatives have been launched to support and improve the lives of headload workers in Burrabuzar, Kolkata.

Conclusion: A Growing Legacy

From its humble beginnings, Calcutta SEED has grown into a dynamic organization that touches the lives of thousands of children, families, and communities across Bengal. Its multifaceted approach—ranging from educational sponsorship, disaster management, women empowerment and community development — reflects—its commitment to holistic, sustainable growth. While much has been achieved, the society continues to strive toward its goal of uplifting the marginalized through education and empowerment.





The seeds of Calcutta SEED (Calcutta Society for Encouragement of Education and Development) were sown with the inspiration and zeal to work for underprivileged children in the field of education and empowerment through development. Founded by Fr. Franklin, Fr. John, and other like-minded individuals from various professions, this initiative grew into a registered society on July 22, 1994. Today, Calcutta SEED continues its mission to empower disadvantaged, poor, and marginalised women and children, thanks to the dedication and vision of its founders and supporters.


In the course of last thirty years, the seed has sprouted, grown into a tree and is bearing fruit. The different activities for poor children in the field of education and skill training are now on at St. Philip's Nursery School at Shakuntala Park managed by dedicated Helpers of Mary Sisters, and in the premises of the Cathedral of the Most Holy Rosary, at the initiative of Fr. Franklin Menezes and his dedicated band of teachers. Similar activities are carried out in the suburbs of Kolkata for the poor and needy children. Unemployed but interested poor women are attending Tailoring classes and making a decent income for their families. All these are the fruits of Calcutta SEED.

As Calcutta SEED celebrates the THIRTY YEARS of its existence, I thank God who inspires people to sow the seeds of charity and gives the growth. We remember the pioneers and all those who have laboured hard to bring about the welfare and empowerment of poor children and women through educational and social programmes during the past 30 years.

The Calcutta Society for Encouragement of Education and Development (Calcutta SEED) was founded in 1994 as a registered society focused on the holistic development of children in Calcutta and its neighbouring areas. The first executive committee worked diligently to secure registration under the Income Tax Act and to obtain FCRA (Foreign Contribution Regulation Act) registration, enabling the society to receive funding from overseas.

In 1999, I was invited to join the Executive Committee, and subsequently, I was elected as the President of the society. During my tenure, we extended our support to tribal children in the Bankura and Burdwan districts, offering non-formal education. Through the innovative memory-based learning method. Targeted Academic Growth," developed by Fr. Mongal Das, SJ, we were able to help many tribal children, who had never attended school. transition into regular formal education within a short period. Approximately 15 coaching centres utilized Fr. Mongal Das' methodology, assisting around 500 underprivileged students.

Calcutta SEED also expanded its services to include vocational guidance, skill training, and counselling for youth. In addition to educational support, some children received medical assistance. With donations from various benefactors.

Calcutta SEED helped construct around 400 houses for flood victims in the Burdwan and Birbhum districts.



I am happy to reflect on my close association with Calcutta SEED as it commemorates its Pearl Jubilee this year. I feel privileged to have been involved with the organization for almost a decade of its history. Just as a seed grows into a tree and bears many fruits, Calcutta SEED has produced countless blessings in the lives of children. Many children and their families have benefited immensely from Calcutta SEED's services.

While many of Calcutta SEED's achievements come to mind, I would like to focus on the devastating floods of 2000, which caused severe damage in South Bengal. During this calamity, thousands of houses were destroyed, crops worth ₹40 crores were washed away, and many people lost their household belongings, savings, and important documents. In the aftermath of the disaster, several NGOs came forward to provide relief and rehabilitation for those affected.

Calcutta SEED was one of the first to respond, launching relief efforts immediately. In collaboration with the Missionaries of Charity Sisters, we organized medical camps and distributed relief materials and dry food to victims along the banks of the Ajoy River. More than 5,000 people in the Birbhum and Burdwan districts were provided with food supplies that lasted for a week. Generous donors also

contributed to help children who had lost their books, stationery, and clothes in the flood. In addition to providing educational support, the executive board of Calcutta SEED decided to take a long-term approach by building brickwall houses for those living in flood-prone areas, who previously resided in vulnerable mud-wall houses.

With the support of Fr. John Noronha, the founder Secretary of Calcutta SEED, and financial assistance from Caritas India, we initiated steps to construct nearly 400 homes for poor tribal and marginalized families affected by the floods. By doing so, we ensured not only food and clothing for the children but also safe shelter for their families. Between 2001 and 2005, 380 houses were built in Purbasthali Block I and II of the Purba Burdwan district after a careful survey

identified the most vulnerable households. The Calcutta SEED executive committee closely monitored the construction process. Our animation sessions also motivated the local people to contribute their labour toward building these homes, with Calcutta SEED covering 75% of the construction costs and the people contributing the remainder. The beneficiaries remain deeply grateful to Calcutta SEED and the donors who made this possible.



Reflecting on Achievements and Growth Highlights of this year include:

- 1. Educational Sponsorship and Assistance: Our Roots of Hope Sponsorship and Learning Support Programme has provided financial and academic support to underprivileged children, enabling their uninterrupted journey through school. In partnership with caring donors, we have covered school fees, provided study materials, and ensured each child receives the guidance necessary to thrive academically and personally.
- 2. Learning Centres and Skill Development: Calcutta SEED's Knowledge Tree Learning Tree Centre at the Cathedral and Learning Tree Learning Centre at Solo Bigha and Sakhsham Computer Centres at the Cathedral and Kolsur, North 24 Parganas have been pivotal in bridging educational gaps for disadvantaged youth. - 3. Empowering Women and Youth through Vocational Training: Projects such as Tejaswini, which trains women in solar technology, and the Roshnee Tailoring Training Centre at the Cathedral and Sew-Wings at Salajpur exemplify our mission to foster independence and dignity in women. In urban and rural areas alike, these programs not only build skills but also uplift spirits and enhance livelihoods, especially for women seeking economic independence.
- 4. Holistic Healthcare Initiatives: The Real Homeoclinic, offering accessible homeopathic care weekly, and different healthcare initiatives for the Mutiyas (headload labourers) of Burrabazar provides crucial health support to the most needy. These services embody our holistic approach to community care, meeting both physical and emotional needs through compassionate care.



Use of Infrastructure by Local Community



Looking Forward

The upcoming year will focus on further enhancing the academic programs, maintaining infrastructure, and strengthening community engagement. We aim to create a more enriching and secure environment for our students, alongside reinforcing collaboration with local organizations like Calcutta SEED.







In December 2007, during a Christmas program at St. Francis Xavier Church, Bowbazar, the then Parish Priest and co-founder of Calcutta SEED announced that a new Montessori school would be established under Calcutta SEED. Preparations for the school's opening began in April 2008, culminating in my interview at St. Francis Xavier Church, Bowbazar on May 13th.

Admission forms were made available on June 1st, marking the official establishment of 'St. Philips Nursery School,' which opened its doors on June 16th with an initial enrollment of five students. The key personnel included myself, Manjula Ghosh, as Principal, Megha Toppo as a teacher, Sumi Lakra as janitress, and Prabhat Adhikary as caretaker.

Our inaugural Teacher's Day and Christmas programs were held, attended by Father Sarto, with help from Father John and a small group of seven students. By the end of 2008, the student body had grown to seven students in the nursery class.

In 2009, we expanded to include a KG class with seven students, alongside 12 students in the nursery class. We welcomed Tania Roy as the KG teacher. Our first progress meeting for St. Philips School took place on April 14th,

2009, with notable attendees including I.P. Sarto, Bishop C. Monis, and Father Gerry.

In September 2009, Father Gerry assumed the role of Secretary. Regular progress meetings were held at Bowbazar Church three times a year. By the end of 2009, our student body had increased to approximately 25 students, and by the start of 2010, the total enrollment reached 30 students.

The school continued to flourish through various activities, including picnics and celebrations for Children's Day and Teacher's Day. In 2014, the school came under the leadership of Father Franklin. In 2018, I stepped down as Principal, ensuring a smooth transition to new leadership for the continued growth of St. Philips Nursery School.

Project Period: April 2023 to March 2024 Supported by Education All, Belgium

The Knowledge Tree Learning Centre, is an educational initiative aimed at reintegrating school drop-outs and street and underprivileged children, who dropped out during the COVID-19 pandemic, into formal education. The project provides a structured curriculum focusing on English language proficiency and foundational mathematical skills for children aged 5 to 14 years. By the end of March 2024, 13 out of 60 registered children had successfully transitioned to formal schools.

Target Area and Population

The Knowledge Tree operates in the heart of Burabazaar, a densely populated commercial area. The primary beneficiaries are children from the surrounding slums, such as those around Podder Court, who have limited access to quality education.

Goals and Objectives

Goal: To provide quality education, focusing on English language skills, to marginalized children, thereby helping them compete with peers in English-medium schools.

Purpose: To bridge the educational gap for street children and provide them with the tools necessary for long-term academic and social success.

Strategy: Utilize hands-on, skill-based methodologies tailored to children's specific learning needs. The program emphasizes holistic development, including extracurricular activities such as art, craft, and dance.

Program Approach

The program has implemented the following steps:

- Classroom Infrastructure: Investment in modern educational tools, including furniture, visual aids (TVs, tablets, LCD projectors), a collection of 300 storybooks, and internet connectivity.
- Teaching Staff: Recruitment of experienced and trained educators capable of handling the academic and socio-emotional needs of the children.
- Curriculum Design: Tailored to meet the individual needs of children, focusing on practical, skill-based learning.
- Extracurricular Activities: Activities such as art, craft, dance, and sports enhance children's overall development.

Key Achievements

- Admissions to Formal Schools: 13 children were admitted to prestigious schools by the end of March 2024.
- Continued Support: An after-school program provides continued academic assistance to students who have transitioned to formal schools.

Main Activities

Throughout the year, various academic and extracurricular events were conducted, including:

- Competitions: Singing, Recitation, and Cookery competitions.
- Cultural Celebrations: Rabindra Jayanti, Republic Day, Christmas.
- Counseling and Awareness Programs: These were held to educate women on health and social issues.

- Irregular Attendance: Due to frequent trips to villages and parental responsibilities, maintaining regular attendance of all 60 students has been difficult.
- Household Responsibilities: Some parents rely on their children for household work, which hampers attendance.



From Loss to Learning:

Veer and Rikky's Inspiring Educational Journey

Background: Veer (13) and Rikky (11) Singh lost their mother to suicide in January 2024. Both brothers, raised by their maternal grandmother, had no prior schooling experience after COVID-19.

Progress: In just over a year, both brothers developed proficiency in English and mathematics. Veer was admitted to Class 6 and Rikky to Class 5 at Sacred Heart Chinese School. They continue to receive academic support and meals at the center after school hours.



Future Plans

Moving forward, the Knowledge Tree project aims to:

- Increase attendance consistency by addressing family-related challenges.
- Expand its outreach to admit more children from the local community.
- Continue providing academic and emotional support for children transitioning to formal schooling.

Conclusion

At Calcutta SEED, we recognize that education is incomplete without proper nutrition. A hungry child struggles to focus, retain information, and participate in learning activities. The children studying at the Centre come from families of hand cart pullers, porters, and rickshaw pullers in the bustling trade hub of Burrabazar. These families struggle with extreme poverty, often living in makeshift shelters with little to no access to proper meals. Malnutrition is a pressing concern, affecting children's physical and cognitive development. Recognizing the urgent need for intervention, the Knowledge Tree Nutrition Programme was designed to provide daily nutritious meals to 50 underprivileged children, ensuring they receive the sustenance necessary for healthy growth and learning.

Programme Objectives

The key goals of the Knowledge Tree Nutrition Programme include:

Providing Daily Nutritious Meals – Ensuring that children have access to well-balanced meals that meet their dietary needs.

Enhancing Learning Outcomes – A well-fed child is more attentive, energetic, and capable of grasping lessons effectively.

Promoting Physical and Cognitive Development – Proper nutrition strengthens the immune system, reducing absenteeism due to illness.

Encouraging School Attendance – Many children come to school because they know they will receive a hot meal, fostering regular attendance.



What's on the Plate?

Each meal is carefully planned to provide essential nutrients and includes::

- Rice A staple providing necessary carbohydrates for energy.
- Dal (Lentils) A rich source of protein for muscle development.
- Vegetables Essential vitamins and minerals for overall health.
- Eggs (occasionally) A protein supplement for better nourishment.
- Fruits & Milk (once a week) Additional nutrition for immunity and growth.

A dedicated cook prepares meals hygienically, ensuring that the children receive well-balanced, fresh food daily.

Implementation and Monitoring

The programme follows a structured implementation plan to maintain quality and efficiency:

Daily Attendance & Meal Records – Tracking the number of children receiving meals.

Quarterly Health Check-ups – Conducted by a doctor/nutritionist to assess the children's growth and overall health.

Monthly Reports – Documenting the food provided and evaluating its impact on the children's well-being.

Through continuous monitoring and evaluation, we ensure that every meal served contributes to the health and development of these young learners.

The Impact So Far

The introduction of nutritious meals has significantly improved the health and academic performance of the children at the Knowledge Tree Learning Centre. Some key outcomes observed include:

Improved Concentration & Classroom Participation – With adequate nutrition, children are more alert and engaged in learning activities.

Better Physical Health – Fewer cases of illness and increased stamina among students.

Increased Attendance – Knowing they will receive a meal at school motivates children to attend regularly.

Community Engagement – Parents and guardians are actively involved, appreciating the positive impact on their children.

Future Plans & Expansion

The Knowledge Tree Nutrition Programme is a three-year initiative (2024-2027), with plans to expand its reach and improve dietary support by:

- Increasing the number of beneficiaries to support more children in need.
- Adding more protein-rich foods like eggs and milk more frequently.
- Incorporating nutrition education sessions for both children and their families.
- Establishing sustainable funding models to ensure long-term impact.

Additionally, we aim to integrate vocational training for mothers, empowering them with skills in nutrition and food preparation, which can help sustain healthy eating habits at home.

The Learning Tree Learning Centre at Solo Bigha was established with the mission to provide comprehensive learning support to the children from marginalized and impoverished families living in the slum area of Solo Bigha. Supported by Stichting Actie Calcutta, the centre focuses on offering quality education in English, Math, and Environmental Studies (EVS) to children aged 5 to 14. The program employs the "Joyful Learning" pedagogy to engage children in both academics and extracurricular activities like games, drawing, and cultural celebrations.

- Irregular Attendance: Frequent absenteeism due to conjunctivitis outbreaks during the rainy season, seasonal illnesses, and children helping their parents with household work.
- Parent Support: Some parents do not prioritize education, which affects the regular attendance and engagement of children.

Despite these challenges, efforts are being made to engage parents through counseling sessions and awareness programs to emphasize the importance of education.

Future Plans

Learning Tree aims to further strengthen its outreach by:

- Increasing student retention and attendance through community engagement.
- Continuing its collaboration with Stichting Actie Calcutta to improve learning resources and provide nutritional and health support.







July 2023 - June 2024 Supported by: Green Energy Against Poverty e.V

The Tejaswini Project was initiated to empower women in the villages of **Salajpur** and **Kutki** (Narayangarh Block, Paschim Medinipur) by teaching them to assemble and sell solar lanterns, LED bulbs, and night lights. The project aimed to provide skills that improve access to green energy and foster micro-entrepreneurship

Main Activities

- Training: 25 women from the two villages were trained to assemble solar lanterns, LED bulbs, and night bulbs. Training sessions were held thrice weekly, in two groups.
- Production and Sales:
 - 150 solar lanterns, 100 LED bulbs, and 1000 night bulbs were assembled and sold.
 - Three solar panels were installed.
- Special Events: Women's Day and other community events were celebrated to raise awareness about environmental protection and gender equity.
- Market Initiatives: Two exhibitions were held, and the women participated in selling products during Women's Day celebrations.

Challenges and Response

- Challenges:
 - Initial reluctance to participate in sales.
 - Dropouts due to slow earnings during the training phase.
- Response:
 - Expanding the product line to include LED and night bulbs.
 - Coordinators supported sales efforts by joining women in outreach activities.

Outcomes and Future Plans

Empowerment:

The 25 women have gained technical skills in assembling solar products and selling them.

Revenue:

Sales generated Rs. 50,000, which will be reinvested in procuring new materials.

Future Plans:

- Establish a dedicated shop for solar products.
- Train local technicians for solar panel installations.
- Explore technology for solar-powered mobile phone charging.




Story of Change

Mahima Das, a village resident, purchased a solar lantern before Cyclone Remal. During the three-day power outage caused by the cyclone, her family was able to use the solar lantern for lighting and her child's studies.







April 2023 - March 2024 Supported by Likvidace Lepry, The Czech Republic

Project Sammaan which began on March 18, 2023 focuses on addressing the psychosocial and behavioral challenges of the headload laborers (Mutiyas) in Burrabazar, Kolkata. These workers face numerous issues, including addiction, health risks, and lack of access to social security. The project aims to bring about long-term behavioral change through awareness programs, health interventions, and social security support.

Key Achievements

- Health Camps: Multiple health camps were conducted, providing crucial medical services. These included:
 - Physiotherapy sessions to address musculoskeletal issues among Mutiyas.
 - General medical check-ups that ensured early detection of potential health issues.
 - Eye checkups that led to the

- distribution of prescriptive glasses, improving vision and quality of life for many participants.
- Cancer screening camps that focused on early detection and prevention measures.
- Awareness Campaigns: The project utilized a variety of interactive methods, such as puppet shows and community meetings, to educate the Mutiyas on essential health and hygiene topics. Campaigns raised

- awareness on the prevention of Dengue, Malaria, and STDs. Cultural events and national celebrations, like Independence and Republic Day, further strengthened community ties and engagement.
- De-addiction Workshops: The project conducted targeted de-addiction workshops that addressed the prevalent issue of substance abuse within the Mutiya community. These workshops provided education and support, helping individuals on their path to recovery from addiction.
- HIV/AIDS Testing and Referrals: Testing services for HIV/AIDS were introduced, along with referrals to healthcare facilities for those in need. This crucial intervention addressed a significant health risk within the community.
- Community Building and Engagement: Beyond health and education, the project facilitated regular cultural celebrations, such as Republic Day, which helped foster a sense of identity, pride, and unity among the Mutiyas. These events were wellattended and created a strong sense of community cohesion.

Challenges and Lessons Learned

Challenges:

- Limited participation in some due awareness programs to scheduling conflicts and stigma surrounding certain issues. like HIV/AIDS and addiction.
- Logistical difficulties in organizing workshops and camps, such as aligning availability of resources.

• Lessons Learned:

- Flexibility in scheduling workshops and camps was crucial in engaging more participants.
- Tailoring programs and awareness messages to the specific needs of the Mutiyas helped increase participation and impact.



Stories of Change

Breaking the Chains of Addiction

Mathura Yadav, a 45-year-old headload labourer from the streets of Kolkata, spent more than two decades trapped in the clutches of alcohol addiction. With no formal education and a monthly income of approximately ₹10,000, Mathura struggled to manage his day-to-day life. Alcohol became his coping mechanism, offering temporary relief from the harsh realities of his physically demanding job. However, the long-term consequences were devastating—his health deteriorated. suffered. productivity family and his plummeted.

When Mathura came into contact with Project Sammaan, he was initially reluctant to participate in the de-addiction workshops. Like many in his position, he had grown accustomed to the patterns of addiction and was skeptical about whether change was even possible. However, through patient outreach and continuous engagement by the project team, Mathura began attending the de-addiction sessions.

The workshops were structured to create a supportive, non-judgmental space where participants could openly discuss their struggles with substance abuse. Mathura was exposed to educational materials on the physical, mental, and social harms of alcohol addiction. For the first time, he started to realize how deeply his dependence on alcohol was affecting his overall well-being.

With the guidance of counselors and peer support, Mathura slowly began to reduce his alcohol consumption. The workshops also introduced him to healthier coping mechanisms, such as yoga and meditation, which helped him manage stress and anxiety.

Over time, he regained control over his life and health. Today, Mathura proudly calls himself sober and is no longer reliant on alcohol to navigate the pressures of his laborious work.

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Beyond his personal health improvements, Mathura's transformation has positively impacted his family. His relationships, once strained by his addiction, have strengthened, and he now contributes more effectively to household responsibilities. He credits Project Sammaan not only with saving his life but with giving him a renewed sense of purpose. Mathura's story stands as a testament to the power of education, community support, and determination in overcoming deeply ingrained habits.



Vocational and Skill Development

April 2023 to March 2024 Supported by Stichting Actie Calcutta



The Shaksham (Computer) project by Calcutta SEED has been effective to bridge the digital divide for the socio-economically deprived youth the Burrabazar area. Since April 2023, Sakhsham provided essential computer training to underprivileged young individuals, equipping them with basic word processing skills crucial for employment in today's world. The first batch saw 10 out of 13 students complete their course, while the second batch faced higher dropout rates, with 6 out of 13 training. Despite these continuing their challenges, program's impact significant, fostering digital literacy enhancing the employability of its participants.

Shaksham has proven to be a vital stepping stone for these youth and we hope that the skills they have honed would eventually open doors to new opportunities in the future.



Roshnee Tailoring Training Centre Burrabazar



The Roshnee (Tailoring) project, initiated by Calcutta SEED, has helped empower women in Burrabazar and LalBazar area in Kolkata. During the reporting year since April 2023, two batches of women underwent comprehensive tailoring training, mastering an different tailoring skills from hand stitching to creating sophisticated garments like anarkali kameezes and patiala salwars. The first batch saw 11 out of 15 trainees successfully complete their course, while the second batch had 12 out of 16. Despite a few dropouts, the dedication of the women was palpable. One Miss Tisha Mallick, who, after completing her training, purchased her own sewing machine and now earns a steady income of Rs 4000 per month.

The training not only imparted practical skills but also boosted the confidence and economic independence of these women, preparing them to face the future with renewed vigour and self-reliance.







Sakhsham Computer Centre Baduria

A new centre was setup in Kolsur, Baduria to assist the rural youth in developing computer skills so that they become empowered with digital literacy.9 computers were setup and 50 students have been enrolled in the first batch. Two teachers are assisting in the programme which is held both offline and online. Different topics is being covered which will ensure that the youth hone comprehensive digital skills.



The first batch of the rural centre of Roshnee Tailoring Training Centre in Bezda had 10 students. The second batch of 10 students are currently learning tailoring skills at the centre. There are 12 sewing machines and 1 teacher to help the students hone their skills.

Introduction to Real Homoeopathy

Progress and Highlights

Educational Assistance Throughout the year: Roots of Hope has extended financial aid to a group of dedicated students, each facing challenging economic conditions. Monthly support, primarily in the form of direct monetary contributions, enabled the students to continue their schooling without disruption. The provision of essential learning materials helped reinforce their academic foundation, while regular tuition classes facilitated both academic progress and confidence-building among the students.

Tracking Student Development:

Regular monitoring has been pivotal in ensuring students' sustained progress. The program's evaluative approach involved consistent check-ins and assessments. highlighting any challenges the children faced academically or personally. This hands-on support structure allowed prompt interventions when needed, creating a stable and supportive learning environment.

Community and Extracurricular Engagement: In addition to academic support, the program integrated activities to foster students' holistic development. From celebrating significant events like Independence Day and Republic Day to organizing educational trips and talent showcases, these experiences enriched the lives of the children, encouraging them to express themselves creatively and learn about cultural heritage.


- 9 students received financial aid this year.
